Final Exam: Thursday, December 21, 2006, 10:15 AM-12:15 PM Bunce 350

Course Objectives: To learn the present tense of regular, irregular, and stem-changing verbs, the preterite of regular verbs, selected grammatical structures, and basic vocabulary:

greetings, family life, pastimes, travel, and shopping. Although all four skills (listening, speaking, reading, writing) will be covered, special attention will be paid to oral communication and improving students' command of the written language. Students will also increase their knowledge of Spanish and Spanish American culture with selected readings and classroom activities.

Attendance Policy: Please review the University's attendance policy in the Catalogue. The following class attendance policy is presented in accordance with paragraph 5, "additional attendance criteria." Foreign language learning depends on constant reinforcement, so missed classes are missed opportunities to practice what you have learned. You will not be able to "keep up" just by reading the textbook; you must be present, prepared, and actively participating with your classmates in order to learn. After two or more consecutive absences, a note from a physician or explanation in writing from the Office of Student Affairs (Savitz Hall) must be provided upon the

student's return to class. If you miss five (5) classes or more for any reason, your class participation grade will be **F**. If you have an emergency resulting in an extended absence you must contact me personally to discuss the situation. Students are responsible for all missed work. Tardiness will not be tolerated. Two latenesses will be counted as one absence.

Grading: Your final grade will be calculated on the following basis: 10% for each of three (3) unit exams, 25% final exam (cumulative and including Lección 6), 25% average of written assignments (temas) and weekly quizzes, 20% class participation/attendance. There will be no makeup quizzes or exams. Weekly quizzes will be administered during the first few minutes of class and will not be preannounced, so you must be in class on time in order to receive credit.

Pass-No Credit Option: Please consult the catalogue for a definition of the P/NC grade. If you intend to take this class P/NC, please notify me in writing by Monday, October 9, 2006. The last day to withdraw without penalty is October 23, 2006. Spanish majors & minors may not take this course P/NC.

Language Lab: Students are required to use the lab and do the lab manual exercises for each chapter covered. You may use the lab directly (Bunce 302) or ask the lab director, Elaine Brigandi, to copy the class units for you onto cassettes or audio CDs for you to listen to at home (media fee of \$1.00 charged). If you do not keep up with your lab exercises, you will not be able to participate in class or pass the weekly quizzes. I receive a weekly report of who is using the lab or copying lessons, and I assign a grade (Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory) to each student accordingly.

Vistas ancillaries: In addition to your textbook, workbook, and lab manual, the *Vistas* program employs interactive CD-ROMs and vocabulary CDs keyed to the corresponding sections in your textbook. You are required to view the *Fotonovela* video CD-ROM at the beginning of each chapter to give you an overview of the vocabulary, grammatical structures, and cultural points that we will be learning. You should use these disks daily to study and reinforce your listening and reading comprehension, although they do not appear specifically assigned on the syllabus.

Student accommodation policy: Your academic success is important. If you have a documented disability that may have an impact upon your work in this class, please contact me.
