 the first that I have received from you.
 I took more delight in perusing it, and
 added to the pleasure of an acquaintance
 with one whom before I had but an
 imperfect idea of made it doubly interesting.
 The pleasure of keeping up a good correspondence
 in writing will be seen to be very beneficial to
 us as tending to advance us in the art of com-
 posing and a good familiarity in calling to
 mind and distributing words in writing
 and composing sentences and discourses.
 The family are all in good health at present
 and have been so during my father's absence
 except my youngest Brother Lucius A.J.
 was unwell for about a week. It has been
 and is very healthy through the country
 generally. My father arrived here on
 Monday evening last in good health.
 I have not received any letter from Charles
 since Decr 1816. I have wrote two or three
 to him since that time and I had presumed
 that he had forgotten me but I was
 informed by my father that he had
 written several to me since that time.
 But I have not recd any. Give my
 respects to him and tell him that I have
 not forgotten him and hope that he will
 continue the correspondence. I shall expect a letter
 from him and also from yourself on the receipt
 of this or as soon as convenient. There has
 been a large quantity of potatoes and grain
 of all kinds harvested in this country the
 past season. I am now in the office with my
 father studying Mathematics we expect
 there will be a half dozen scholars here
 next Monday to study in the same branch
 with myself. I have nothing more of
 importance to communicate. Give my
 love to all my cousins at Belfast also to
 Uncle Boardman and Aunt Johnson and
 accept a part for yourself and I shall ever
